Pastor's thoughts ...

I'm sure that, for many of you, the name Peggy March doesn't ring a bell. Back in 1963, 15-year-old "Little Peggy March" claimed the number 1 spot on the charts with her single "I Will Follow Him". The song was, then, immortalized in the film "Sister Act", where it was performed by the nuns' chorus for the Pope with Whoopi Goldberg's character as the lead singer.

I remembered this song (and now it stays there, lurking and haunting my every waking minute) as I started preparing this week's liturgy. Today's gospel is central to our understanding of following Jesus which, as we know, is the constant theme of Mark's gospel. We can divide this gospel passage in two parts.

In the first part Jesus asks the disciples to tell him who do people think that he actually is. They give him a number of different answers. Then he asks them the most important question: "But who do you say that I am?" This is what really matters for Jesus. If I want to follow someone, I have to know that person. It doesn't matter what other people think of her/him. What matters is who is that person for me. It is a personal knowledge coming out of an ever-growing personal relationship. The way two lovers see and know one another is different to the way other people know them. In the gospel, Peter shows that he knows quite well who Jesus is. "You are the Christ," he tells him. Right answer, but what kind of Christ, or Messiah, was Peter envisioning? Jesus wanted to make sure that Peter not only understood that Jesus was the Messiah, but also the kind of Messiah he was. The people were expecting a Messiah which would have been a worldly leader and liberator of the people from Roman occupation. Jesus had other ideas, and he told them about his upcoming passion, death and resurrection. This is not what Peter wanted to hear. Talk of rejection, suffering and assassination were not consonant with his idea of a Messiah! Somehow, he was so taken by surprise that he did not even hear the last bit about the resurrection. So, the gospel tells us that he rebuked Jesus. He wanted to tell Jesus what he should or should not do!

And here comes the second part of our story. Following Peter's reaction, it was now Jesus' turn to rebuke Peter by telling him "Get behind me, Satan!" The role of the disciple is to follow, not to lead the master. His place is, therefore, behind the master, not in front of him. The disciple lets the master lead, and then walks on the master's footsteps. Today's message is very important for us. First of all, let us ask ourselves the question, "who is Jesus for me?" It's not what have others told me about Jesus. What my parents, teachers, catechists or priests told me about him as I was growing up was very important, but not enough. To really know Jesus, I need to enter into a real, living relationship with him. That is why Jesus told his disciples not to tell anybody about the fact that he was the Christ. He wanted people to come to know him through personal experience, not through hearsay. As a disciple, I also have to learn to follow, to allow him to lead the way. Very often in our lives we tend to do like Peter did by telling Jesus what he should do. Aren't most of our prayers about asking the Lord to change some situation which we do not particularly like? Walking on Jesus' footsteps means living the same life he lived: a life of selfless, self-giving and life-giving love. That is what passion, death and resurrection is all about. Because true love implies dying to oneself to give life to others. Some might say that this is not easy. Peter (the one who cut off the servant's ear during the passion narrative!) found it difficult, but eventually he made it. If Peter made it, we can, too. As the song goes:

"I will follow him

Follow him wherever he may go

There isn't an ocean too deep

A mountain so high it can keep me away."


help him to continue to grow as a mature Christian.
